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Shri Kalaa Mandir affirms Bharatanatyam's storytelling prowess

Shri Kalaa Mandir and artistic director Guru Sujatha Srinivasan presented "Vivarta/Transformations" as one half of the "Worlds Allied" program at Cuyahoga Community College on Friday March 25th in a full auditorium. Vivarta traveled from the Big Bang to the current climate perturbations in a tight choreography that maintained the storyline. In the second half "FEAST: a ballet" merged visual art and ballet to explore colonial exploitation.

Can Bharatanatyam speak to the modern audience without losing its identity? This production answers with a resounding yes.



Guru Sujatha Srinivasan's choreography made full use of Bharatanatyam's vocabulary to convey the creation of heavenly bodies and evolution; and emotions of wonder, harmony and happiness, but also pride and covetousness which destroy the nurturing Earth. The deer and birds and elephants were the ones drawn to Krishna's flute. War scenes coalesced to depict relentless exploitation and eventual destruction. Guru Sujatha has crafted a fresh, powerful narrative to tell this very contemporary story of the consequence of heedless human manipulation of the environment, using Bharatanatyam's oft-used devices.

The music adapted from a production of the eminent violinists Lalgudi GJR Krishnan and Lalgudi GJR Vijayalakshmi was a perfect complement. An overlaid narration by assistant choreographer Shriya Srinivasan took the audience forward without condescension. The production ended on the hopeful note we need now, of redemption through reconciliation to resolve issues and build collaboratively.



Did I mention that the troupe did not compromise an ounce of their tradition? The talented cast included Shriya Srinivasan, Nithya Kasibhatla, Sita Vakkalanka, Janaki Nair, Pooja Vallampati, Sudhiksha Ramesh, Sneha Upadhyayula, Yuvha Karthikeyan and Sristi Ithychanda. Shri Kalaa Mandir's senior dancers cleaved to the Vazhuvoor tradition of their Guru. Their movements are infused with the music, and their abhinayam is beguiling. Since the senior dancers are also accomplished scientists living in different states, this harmonious production is a tribute as much to their dedicated hard work as to their training.

"Jaipur Foot". Dr. Nagula worked very hard to get 200 prospective candidates transported from remote villages 30-40 miles away, & got their legs measurements. Dr. Vuppala got custom made foots by Ratna Nidhi Trust,

Mumbai and got them fitted in Vizag, AP. It is a heart breaking sight to see an amputee coming to the camp dragging on his/her butts and walking away straight with a million dollar smile.

3. Mobile Vans for Early Detection of Cancers

a .In 2016, RC-Bengaluru inspired AIPNO-Medical YATRA to join with them in Global Grant to

examining Woman patient for a potential early symptoms of Cervical Cancer, this suitcase has all equipment necessary for Examination, Lab testing and Cryogenic Gun to burn the tissues for pre-malignant cervical lesions...ALL in a suitcase. Goal is to train health care workers to do this work in the field without anesthesia and send patient home CANCER FREE in 1-2 hrs.

5. Surgeries

Uptil 2019 surgeries was a missing component in Medical YATRA.2019 RC-Gandevi invited Medical YATRA to join a Global Grant for 130 Surgeries-Hernia, Appendicitis, Gall Bladder, Mitral Valve, Cardiac, Knee Replacements, etc..- RC-Ludhiana, P. did Global Grant for 400 Surgeries.

6. ROTARY Global Grants & Funding

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"Darshana," the Traveling Exhibition of Hindu Civilization Embraced in Cleveland

"Darshana," the Traveling Exhibition of Hindu Civilization Embraced in Cleveland

Cleveland, Saturday, April 9, 2022. US-based Dharmic organizations, practicing the four core Indic religions — Hinduism, Buddhism, Jainism, and Sikhism — and myriad Indic philosophies, held a traveling exhibition titled "Darshana — A Glimpse into the Hindu Civilization." The Hindu Swayamsevak Sangh (HSS, USA) initiated the development of this exhibition, which intends to present a glimpse into the developments in and contributions to the modern world of the ancient Hindu society, one of the oldest living civilizations in the world. In addition, it also aims to spread awareness of the ancient Hindu civilization and its contributions to modern society across the cities in the US.

The exhibition was inaugurated on the auspicious occasion of Ram Navmi on Saturday, April 9, 2022, at Solon Library by Solon city mayor Mr. Edward Kraus in the presence of many community members and hundreds of people from local communities who attended the exhibition. It featured vivid-yet-succinct poster displays on 24 different topics related to Yoga, Ayurveda, Dharma, and the traditional attire in ancient India. In addition, it prominently highlighted ancient India's contribution to the world of mathematics, architecture, arts, and sciences and their present-day positive impact on the world. Local children aged 5 through 15 eloquently presented the content in these posters. These posters will undoubtedly inspire an appreciation for and a deeper study of these topics in the larger American community. In addition, these displays also provide a deep dive into the fascinating aspects of Hindu Dharma (traditions, divinity, temples, scriptures, spiritual paths, dharma, and Sewa, i.e., service), its culture (festivals, temples, symbols, etc.), and its contributions (yoga, science, architecture). This exhibition is for people of all ages and all walks of life, and it hopes to foster an open-minded environment of mutual respect and inspiration. Several organizations, including Vishwa Hindu Parishad of America, EKAL USA, Sewa USA, Indica, Chinmaya Mission, Hindu University America, and other scholars, contributed to the content presented in these 24 posters.

"America's strength is not its materialistic prosperity but its cultural diversity," said Mayor Kraus while making his inaugural remarks. He also challenged the supposed dogma of the melting pot, which suggests that people need to shed their faith and culture in order to create a harmonious society. Instead, Mayor Kraus inspired the visitors to cultivate and express their culture and faith. "Our cultural roots and faith make us who we are, and we should be proudly expressing and sharing it with the public with full confidence. The Hindu civilization is eternal and such exhibitions in a foreign land by the Hindu community not only provide an opportunity to non-Hindus to learn about Hinduism but also give an assurance that this eternal Dharmic journey will continue. The Hindu culture has contributed

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much to shape America on different fronts of art, culture, spirituality, science, and economy. Sharing our cultural values with people of other faith and cultures provides an opportunity to identify our commonalities and learn from each other," added Mayor Kraus. Mayor Kraus gave an example of how his Jewish faith has concepts that are similar to those in Hinduism. These include seeing divinity in all living beings and respecting each other. In the end, Mayor Kraus thanked the entire Hindu Community in Solon for inviting him to inaugurate the exhibition and learn about the Hindu faith, traditions, and culture. "It was the children who brought to life the rich Hindu heritage by their presentations touching on all aspects of Hindu life during the exhibition," emphasized Mayor Kraus.

"This exhibition is an effort to showcase not only the time-proven principles and techniques known for revealing the true nature of oneself but also the Hindu civilization's contributions to all aspects of life," said the Cleveland exhibition coordinator Samriddhi Jain during her opening remarks. She further added "this exhibition is a portrayal of 'Hinduness', which is uniquely defined as 'a way of ife,' a product of the Hindu Civilization, born and nurtured in the womb of the Indian subcontinent for over 5000 years. Over the past two centuries, the Western world, including the United States, has been increasingly introduced to Hindu principles and practices, such as Yoga, meditation, vegetarianism, and Ayurveda, the science of holistic medicine. These ancient Hindu customs are now widely accepted and practiced in the US and worldwide. Underlying all of this prolific and organic growth in every realm of material and philosophical pursuits of mankind is the fertile substratum of 'Hinduness',' said Samriddhi Jain. As Hindus, it is our sociocultural responsibility to share the wisdom of this civilization with our fellow citizens in American society. This exhibition provides an opportunity to deepen awareness of Hindu culture and its contributions to society, creating an environment of harmony and coexistence while pursuing Universal Oneness," added Samriddhi Jain.

The HSS Cleveland chapter general secretary gave an overview of past social activities conducted by the Cleveland Chapter. He also extended his thanks to all the participating organizations at the local chapter level during his thanksgiving remarks. He further elaborated on how hundreds of hours of research had been invested in developing the content in the 24 posters on display. He also highlighted that a focus group consisting of Indian-American teenagers and young adults provided invaluable feedback that helped refine the content and enhance the aesthetic quality of these posters. In addition, the local Hindu temples and larger Hindu communities have made enormous contributions to the promotion and display of this exhibition. He also highlighted that this time around, the Hindu new year, April 2, 2022, had been earmarked for the formal launch of the Darshana exhibition. Darshana is expected to continue engaging the community and interfaith leaders, law enforcement officials, local media, officers of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion groups, and educators, among others, to grace the occasion and spread the awareness of Hindu civilization in America.

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There were several dignitaries attended the exhibition, including but not limited to Solon High School Principal Erin Short, India International Editor-Prakash Sinha, and HSS Ohio State president Sitaram Koppaka. 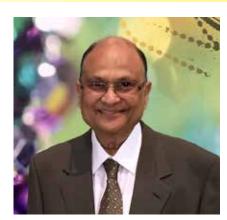






Saffron Patch - Meet Our New Management Team
