Dear Friends of FICA;

Namaste!

There is ample evidence that even a small subset of our Indian community can build gorgeous buildings. There is the Shiva Vishnu Temple, the Richfield Venkateshwara temple, there is the Jain

temple, the Swaminarayan temple, multiple Gurudwaras, and so on. Each one of these, in addition to their reverential value, are

examples of sumptuous architecture and utility.

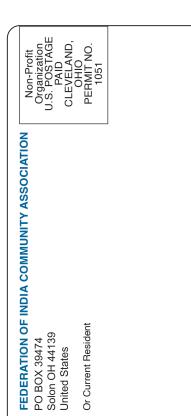
So, the vexing question for me has been, why can't the whole Indian community come together and build something for Bharat Mata, an India Community Center?

Unsuccessful previous attempts have shown the need for funds readiness, the so-called money-in-the-bank readiness. So how do we raise these funds? There are enough blessed people in our community who can donate generously, and we may well call on them later in the process, but to begin with, I envision a grassroots fundraising so that our community feels ownership in this project.

I propose the concept of "A Circle of One Thousand". One thousand families pledge to donate 1000 dollars per year for the next three years. Since this donation will be tax deductible, it really amounts to a much smaller number in reality. 1000 families times 3000 dollars is 3 million. That's a very respectable base to start the process in earnest. I literally imagine a big circle inside the entrance wall of our future ICC building in which these 1000 family names will be inscribed, in alphabetical order. That way, a broad base of our community will feel the connection to this building that will be commensurate with the status and elan of the Indian Community. Finally, these funds will be used for any other purpose, whatsoever.

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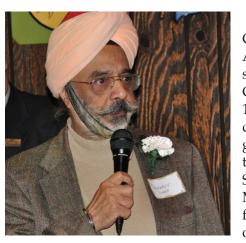
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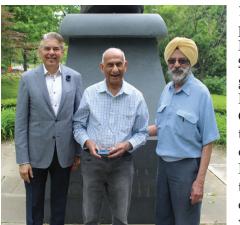
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A Tribute to Legend Paramjit Singh





Paramjit Singh was a Community Leader of the Asian Indian Community since he first landed in Cleveland in June of 1962. Being a Sikh, he has dedicated his life to doing good work and serving the needy. Paramjit Singh completed his Mechanical Engineering from the Indian Institute Technology (I.I.T.) of Kharagpur, India, in 1958 and joined the MBA program at Case Western Reserve University in September 1962. He got involved with the International Student shortly Group and thereafter became its chairman. This gave Paramjit the opportunity to meet students from all

Paramjit Singh of Shaker Heights, Ohio, passed away peacefully on March 28th, 2024. He was 88 years old. He was born on March 1st, 1936, in Lahore, India (now Pakistan), and came to the U.S. in 1962. Since Paramjit was known for sending out homemade birthday cards with acrostic poems using the letters of each person's name, the rest of this tribute is in acrostic form as an ho

profit organization which has provided food and resources to many thousands of Clevelanders of all backgrounds over almost four decades.

over the world and made him a citizen of this world. Being from India gave Paramjit the opportunity to share with his international

friends and Clevelanders, the Indian culture, entertainment, food, and religions, especially Sikhism (the fifth largest religion in the world).

The Cleveland Council of World Affairs asked Paramjit Singh to organize the first Indian dinner to celebrate the 13th Republic Day of India with students and members of the Council. In 1964, he got involved with other members of the Indian community to establish the India Association of Cleveland.

Paramjit Singh made history in Cleveland by being the first turbaned Sikh to be a part of the Case Western Reserve University graduation ceremony (proudly wearing his turban, rather than the traditional mortarboard) in 1965. With the change in the immigration laws and the growth of the Indian community in Cleveland and all over the United States, the National Federation of Indian-American Association (NFIA) was formed in 1980 and that resulted in the creation of the Federation of India Community Associations of NE Ohio (FICA) in 1981, which is a member of NFIA.

Paramjit and his wife Linda came up with the idea that Indian Americans should start giving back to this country for all the opportunities it has provided. They shared their thoughts with FICA and Project SEVA was created with Ohio State

Senator Michael White and Reverend Earl Preston Jr., Pastor of Morning Star Baptist Church. Project SEVA prepared and served a Thanksgiving Dinner to 400 people at the church. The joy that they experienced led Paramjit to share it with the Executive Board of NFIA and Project SEVA was adopted as a national project by NFIA.

Paramjit Singh continued to provide his personal and professional time as a volunteer to add value to the Indian and Ohio communities. He has served as President of FICA, Vice President NFIA, President of the American Society of Engineers of Indian Origin, Cleveland Chapter, Founding member of Asian-Indian-American Business Group, Asian-Indian-American for Better Government, Executive member of Cleveland Mayor George Voinovich's Asian Advisory Council, and more. He explained the basic principles of Sikhism in this short video at the Cleveland City Club. He was inducted into the inaugural class of the Cleveland International Hall of Fame in 2010 along with Senator George Voinovich, Margaret Wong , and other equally distinguished people. Project SEVA Interview with Sangita Bafna



1. Tell me the story behind Project Seva?

Project Seva, one of the 4 service arms of FICA, was started over 35 years ago by a few community members who wished to pay it forward and make a difference within the American community in which they lived. Their mission was to serve meals at homeless shelters around the inner city of Cleveland. Over the years it expanded its services to include distribution of hygiene packages and blankets, However, now distribution of items is based on the shelter's needs for its residents. We have a strict policy of no gift cards. Until 2 years ago, we were 6 members serving various shelters around inner city Cleveland. Today, we are 15 members serving 15 shelters and one church around Cleveland and Akron areas and growing!

2. What are some of the initiatives of Project Seva?

Some of the initiatives of PS are:

a. The annual blanket drive

b. Distribution of hygiene packages, and other items that the shelters may require such as diapers, socks, undergarments, laundry detergent, sheets etc....

c. Serving meals at homeless shelters, and St Coleman's Church on a monthly basis. PS is a 100% volunteer organization. Our volunteers serve their designated shelters every month/quarter, on as needed basis. Our



By Deepa Rao work is funded solely by generous donors of our Indian community.

3. How many volunteers are there? At present there are 15 volunteers

4. How many Shelters does Project Seva help now and any expansion plans?

At present, we serve 15 shelters, and one church, between Cleveland and Akron. In addition, we are planning on expanding our services towards the west side and south side of Cleveland

5. If people want to join Project Seva how can they join or volunteer?

Currently, we are at our maximum capacity for members, however, people can volunteer with PS on a project basis. We also have the monthly meal at St Coleman's church. We encourage the community members to come forward to volunteer for this opportunity. Their children may also enjoy serving the meals. Great exposure for the kids. Any one of the current PS members can be contacted, to find out more about volunteer opportunities. For serving or sponsoring a meal at St Coleman's church they can contact me directly (216-906-9064)



6. If people want to donate funds to Project Seva how can they donate?

To donate to PS, one can go on FICA's website and select the Project Seva tab for donations.

7. You do blanket drive during Thanksgiving tell me something about that?

Our annual blanket drive takes place on/ around October 2nd to commemorate Mahatma Gandhi's birthday. We distribute blankets to all our shelters, on as needed basis.

For this project and other PS projects, we rely solely on our donors. Without their

generosity, we cannot continue to do our excellent work for the homeless community. We request everyone to donate something to PS. Even a \$15 donation will buy one blanket or hygiene packages for the shelters! So,

as you enjoy the comforts of your home, the food on your table, the goes to the cause and it's tax deductible. We use FICAs tax ID. Thank you always for your support!

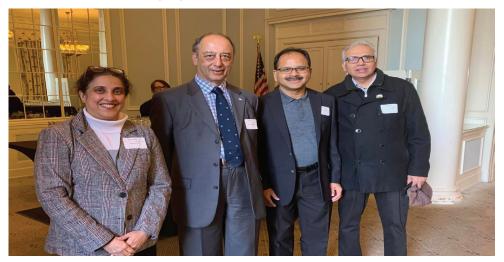

CCWA Indian Forum -By Deepa Rao

Cleveland Council on World Affairs hosted a Forum on India. Dr.Raj and Karen Aggrawal sponsored this forum - India The Emerging Geopolitical and Economic Power- Prospects and Challenges by Dr. Ajay Chhibber a distinguished visiting scholar ,Institute for International Economic Policy ,George Washington UNiversity Non Resident Senior Fellow, South Asia Center, Atlantic Council.Dr. Ajay Chhibber is a Distinguished Visiting Scholar at the Institute of International Economic Policy, George Washington University, and a Non-Resident Senior Fellow at the Atlantic Council. He was India's first Director General of Independent Evaluation with the status of Minister of State in 2013-2014 and Distinguished Visiting Professor at the National Institute for Public Finance and Policy. From 2008-2013 he served as United Nations Assistant Secretary-General and Assistant Administrator at the United Nations Development Programme. He served as the World Bank's Country Director in Turkey and Vietnam and led the 1997 World Development Report on the role of the state. He has published six books on economic development and many articles in international journals FICA table at the International Hall of Fame induction ceremony and major newspapers. His latest book, co-authored with Salman Soz, Unshackling India: Hard Truths and Clear Choices for Economic Revival (Harper-Collins) was declared the Best New Book in Economics for 2022 in the Financial Times and won the India Economic Forum Literary Award for 2022. He has a PhD from Stanford University, a master's degree from the Delhi School of Economics, and has completed advanced management programs at Harvard University and INSEAD, France. He has also taught economics at Georgetown University and the University of Delhi.

His talk was very informative. India is growing in leaps and bounds and still needs to concentrate on women's education, encouraging women to work and also encouraging innovation and research more.

Ekal Vidyalaya Annual Fundraiser

The Cleveland chapter of Ekal Vidyalaya held its annual fundraiser event on Sunday, April 28th at the Independence Middle School. The highlights of the evening were a sumptuous dinner followed by a spectacular music extravaganza that took the audience through a 75-year journey of Bollywood blockbusters. The brilliant vocals were anchored by Hrishikesh Ranade, Madhura Datar and Sharayu Date and ably supported by a team of top-notch instrumentalists from India. Together, they held the audience spellbound for close to 2 hours. They generously performed several "oncemores" as well as took "fermaish" from the audience. This enhanced the audience engagement greatly. This year marked the largest audience yet for this annual event, with over 450 individuals participating. The leadership of the Cleveland chapter worked tirelessly over many months, aided by over 40 volunteers, and executed the event flawlessly. Mrs. Ritu Mahna, aided by Mr. Sudarshan Sathe, Mrs. Swati Sathe, and Dr. Vikas Jain were instrumental in encouraging the audience to donate. The total amount donated and pledged was the highest ever for the Cleveland chapter, \$215,000, significantly exceeding last year's collection of \$155,000.

Ekal Vidyalaya Foundation of India is an organization under the Ekal Abhiyan (movement) that is volunteer driven, and community led. The organization's stated Vision is "Empowering Rural India's Changemakers" and Mission is "Bringing literacy, healthcare, and economic prosperity to remote villages in India". It was established in 1989 with education as its flagship program. It has been expanding towards integrated village development with initiatives for digital literacy, women's



For the first time in the history of Cleveland, a stand-up comedy show in Marathi language was organized by North East Ohio Marathi Mandal on March 22nd, 2024.

About the Artist - Mandar Bhide is the only Indian Stand Up Comedian who has performed in 4 languages - English, Hindi, Marathi & Gujarati. He has an experience of more than 900 shows over the last 8 years & has performed across the length & breadth of India & also internationally. He is the only Marathi comedian who has done international tours of his solo show with shows in Australia, New

empowerment, health services, sustainable agriculture, jobs and skills training. An active and trusted international network of 400,000 volunteers drives its activities. To date, 10 million girls and boys have gained literacy in 80,000 villages and tribal areas in India. There are currently 92,175 schools spread over every state in India, predominantly in remote villages where government or private schools do not exist, and families rely on children to work to support the families. Each primary school is staffed by a single volunteer teacher from the same community, 70% of teachers are women. Children between 4 and 10 years of age receive instruction free of cost, 2 hours a day, 5-6 days a week. Schools are run at informal, accessible places that are central to the village, such as a home or a community center. They are managed by a school oversight committee comprising of parents and community members. Each class consists of 20-30 students. The curriculum across all Ekal's schools follows a standard core of local language, English and Arithmetic. Students also participate in physical education, value education and creative arts. 2.64 million students are currently enrolled. Ekal's teachers are selected by the school oversight committee, have a minimum of 10th grade education, and undergo intense training and consistent supervision. A "Sanch Pramukh" (supervisor) oversees a group of 30 schools. Ekal's model has very low overhead expenses and this makes the endeavor extremely cost effective. It takes \$365 to educate an entire class for a school year (\$1 per day), and this covers teacher training and honorarium and program materials and learning tools for the students.

Of the \$215,000 raised this year, \$185,000 will go towards sponsoring 506 Ekal primary schools. The remaining \$30,000 was raised by 4 generous local families pooling their resources together and is earmarked for a computer training lab that provides digital literacy training to youth in rural villages. The three-month long curriculum was developed in partnership with IIT Bombay to bring digital literacy to the most underserved youth in India's villages and would provide digital literacy to 300-400 students over a period of three years.

Breathe Sleep Thrive 2024 - The Art of Living

Millions of participants across 180 countries have benefitted from the powerful rhythmic breathing called Sudarshan Kriya (SKY) that harmonizes the body-mind complex. Art of Living founder Gurudev Sri Sri Ravi Shankar often says that in order to progress in life, we need to take both the modern and the ancient. Science and spirituality are not opposite to each other, rather complementary.

This April, Cleveland based Art of Living faculty Dr Dipali Desai (Internal Medicine Physician with the University hospitals) organized a science focused workshop in CWRU with Dr Vastav Raman (PhD molecular Biology from Cornell and working as scientist at a global life science company) and Prof Ronnie Newman (Harvard trained researcher, educator and published author).

Dr Vatsav and Prof Ronnie shared many science backed research studies that showed how the practice of Sudarshan Kriya (SKY) helps lower cortisol levels (major stress hormone), significantly improves EEG Beta wave activity that indicates heightened alertness / mental focus, Increased lymphocyte count suggesting enhance immune function. There were studies that showed improvement in sleep and life satisfaction. For many of us who have been practicing SKY and have first hand experience of many benefits, it was good to see science backed validation as well.

Special thanks to Dr Namrata Kumar, Dr Vikram Kumar from AIPNO and Dr Mona Gupta, Dr Satish Kathula from AAPI for attending the event and sharing their thoughts on the importance of incorporating integrative medicine for overall well-being.

Sustainable Cleveland: HSS's Earth Day Commitment to Plastic-Free Living

Sunday, April 21st, Cleveland, OH - "I would not take my lunch in plastic tiffin boxes"; "I would not use plastic bottles anymore"; "I would stop using plastic plates and cutlery in my social family gatherings" - these are not just words, but bold commitments made by several Cleveland community families who came together on Sunday, April 21st, to celebrate Earth Day. This year, Earth Day was observed worldwide with a resolute commitment to end plastics for the sake of human life and planetary health, advocating for a 60% reduction in the production of ALL plastics by 2040.

The Earth Day celebration event in Cleveland was meticulously organized by the HSS, a 501(c)(3) voluntary, non-profit, social, educational, and cultural organization. Their mission is to collectively address societal challenges and contribute to global welfare. With roots deeply intertwined with principles of reverence for nature, non-violence, and interconnectedness, our group in America is increasingly embracing environmentally responsible lifestyles. The keynote speaker at the event was the esteemed Cleveland resident, Dr. Utsav Chaturvedi, a former researcher at CERN laboratories and a passionate environmental activist. Dr. Chaturvedi shed light on the alarming statistics surrounding global plastics, revealing that an estimated 460 million metric tons of plastics clutter our planet, with a staggering 75 to 199 million tons currently polluting our oceans. Shockingly, every minute, one million plastic bottles are purchased worldwide, and up to five trillion plastic bags are used annually. In the USA alone, an estimated 9.7 billion cigarette butts are discarded each year, with 4 billion of them polluting waterways, comprising nearly 20% of all litter.

Dr. Alaka Srivastava, a distinguished biomedical researcher, and the event coordinator, delved into the health implications of plastic usage. She highlighted the adverse effects of Bisphenol (BPA), a chemical found in plastic beverage containers, dinnerware, food can linings and toys. BPA is classified as an endocrine disruptor, linked to increased risks of breast cancer due to its ability to be absorbed by fat tissue.

Additionally, Dr. Srivastava raised concerns about Phthalates, another group of chemicals used in plastics, associated with weight gain, insulin resistance, and reproductive system disorders. She emphasized that when food is wrapped in plastic containing BPA, phthalates may leach into the food, particularly fatty items like meats and cheeses.

On this Earth Day celebration, Cleveland families pledged to reduce plastic usage in their daily lives, raise community awareness about the harmful effects of plastics, adopt and promote plastic-free alternatives, and actively participate in Cleveland's community recycling and plantation efforts. Many students joined this program and celebrated the event by planting Marigold flower trees in pots to mark Earth Day. They plan to care for these saplings over the next few weeks and later gift them to their respective teachers during Teacher Appreciation Week. HSS families will continue to work with Cleveland city to volunteer for city initiatives to protect, nurture, and promote environment-friendly activities in our city schools, businesses, and the community at large, said the HSS Cleveland chapter outreach coordinator, Mr. Sachin Deshpande.

Medical Yatra 2024 (MY-2024) Report

We are happy to say that the number might be a little more than this, as many were seen after registration was closed in most of the locations.

In each camp, the local organizations such as local Rotary clubs, Panchayat, and public health centers (PHC) organized the camp arrangements under the guidance of RCMW. They provided meals and/or snacks to the patients and all volunteers at appropriate times. All the beneficiaries were screened for chronic illnesses and were provided free medicines, counseling, and education. The MY 2024 clinical volunteers team consisted of Internists, Family practitioners, Gynecologist, Nephrologist, Pediatrician, Intensivist and Surgeon serving as primary care providers, yoga therapists, Residents and aspiring medical students. Nonclinicians volunteered for registration, triage, coordination of travels between camps, meals organization, monitoring dispensing of medications, and camp items, and did not leave an area where they did not help. We were very fortunate to have the team, supporting each other everywhere. It was more a MY-2024 family than a working team.

Yoga therapy by our volunteers on-site was provided to the appropriate patients and guided home exercises to continue at home. This service made a big difference in raising awareness about health conditions with a plan to work on for patients while taking some burden off the caregivers, and it was much appreciated by the community and all. RCMW coordinated the stay, travel, and meals for the MY 2024 volunteers and AIPNO-MY shared the cost for the above expenses. MY 2024 volunteers contributed \$450 per person towards their travel expenses during the yatra in India.

Apart from volunteers from MY team from USA, about 500 Rotarians from different Rotary clubs, Rotaractors, and local nursing college students all volunteered to make the camp very successful and a community event. Medical Yatris truly appreciated the volunteers for their Tamil language translation support, which made our mission work possible. RCMW supported MY 2024 with 3 special buses with equipment to screen Cardiac, Cancer, and Dental ailments and also a mobile lab available during the camp days.

This Medical Yatra 2024, conducted in the state of Tamilnadu, was very well received and appreciated by all patients, camp organizers in Tamil Nadu. Our Medical Yatris felt this was a very rewarding experience despite being tiring, with the number of patients seen each day by the providers and the travel to different sites almost every day.

with the goal of showcasing what Akshaya Patra can do for youth and providing young individuals with an opportunity to learn the importance of volunteerism, gain a national stage for their talents, and develop leadership skills. Currently, there are approximately 350 active youth ambassadors nationwide who have organized 65 events across various chapters and raised \$452,000 in 2023. The Cleveland Ohio chapter launched its Youth Ambassador program with an inaugural event on April 14, 2024, at the Shiva Vishnu Temple. The overwhelming support received, with approximately 15-20 youths joining, underscores the community's dedication to the cause and the potential for Akshaya Patra to impact the lives of American youth.

In 2023, the Ohio chapter raised an impressive \$721,620.82. Notably, Cleveland spearheaded an initiative to fundraise for food delivery vans, crucial in ensuring the timely delivery of hot, nutritious meals to school children. This initiative garnered substantial support, with funds raised for six delivery vans (\$25,000 each). The Fear of Missing Out : F.O.M.O.

Shivam's Story

Shivam has just messaged Trevor back on Instagram and has agreed to attend the baseball game with him tonight. But, just ten minutes later, Uma sent Shivam a Snapchat; finally inviting him to a night out with her friends – tonight! In either case, Shivam could have had an enjoyable time, but the fear of missing out (FOMO) on the unchosen option looms over his mind. If Shivam chooses to go out with Uma, he may feel as though he has made the wrong choice. What if Shivam sees in a Facebook post that Trevor caught a home-run ball; could Shivam have been the one to catch it if he had gone? Now likewise, if Shivam chooses to go to the baseball game with Trevor, he may also feel FOMO for not having gone on the date with Uma. What if she posts a photo of her with another guy?

In both cases, Shivam is fantasizing about a better situation in either scenario. This is the core of what makes FOMO so impactful. In these moments, the person experiencing FOMO is focusing on what they lack, rather than what they have. With each option Shivam chose to think about the other, not living in the present moment. Planting the seeds of regret.

What is FOMO?

The fear of missing out, or FOMO, is a new-age label for potential selfenvy. It is the perception that others are partaking in activities that are more desirable than your own: activities that you, yourself, could be participating



in but are not.

The idea that we will be missing out on something by choosing to do something else is innately pessimistic. Options will always be present. Sometimes, the route we must take is clear, and other times, we must make difficult decisions.

To prevent turmoil within our own minds, we must find ways to become content with the choices we make. The popular dictum, "to live life with no regrets" is the antithesis of FOMO and preaches а more optimistic approach.

FOMO and Mental Health

FOMO is a mental health concept, not



an illness. However, if FOMO is left unchecked, it can result in anxiety disorders that get embedded more deeply into the minds of their holders. It can also lead to depression.

If you consistently convince yourself that you are making incorrect decisions, then you may become unable to make decisions at all. You would experience extreme difficulty in coping with the finality of making a choice and potentially become unable to make one.

FOMO is difficult to avoid these days with information overload engulfing us. Our modern world is enveloped with content from our own lives, and from the lives of others, shared publicly for all to see. When each of us share and see, we oversaturate our minds with options and alternatives. Simply stepping back from social media could be the necessary remedy to FOMO.

Abhyanga

Abhyanga is a form of ayurvedic massage that involves massaging the whole body with warm herb infused oils. The oils are cooked with herbs depending on the doshas that need to be balanced. According to ayurvedic texts Bruhat trayi and Laghutrayi, abhyanga is a part of dinacharya (daily practices) to maintain a healthy body and mind. It can be done as an independent therapy for various ailments or as rejuvenation therapy. Also, it is done as part of Panchakarma in the first stage which is called

purva karma (pretreatment). Panchkarma is a five fold therapy used to cleanse, rejuvenate the body and mind over a period of 3 to 21 days depending on healing needed. Abhyanga is often followed by swedana therapy or a warm bath.

Abhyanga is way different than Swedish massage or deep tissue massage which focuses primarily on muscles. Firstly abhyanga is done with warm herb infused oils to balance the doshas. It's another important function is to stimulate the lymphatic system and marma points. Marmas are the points on the skin where there is a strong connection between

consciousness and physiology. Marma points contain all three doshas- vata, pitta and kapha. There are different types of abhyangas. Some of which i offer are -

Sarvang Abhyanga - Full body ayurvedic massage.

Shiro Abhyanga - Ayurvedic head massage. Pada Abhyanga - Ayurvedic foot massage.

There are certain rules to follow before you do abhyanga. Abhyanga should



not be done on a full stomach, if you have indigestion, onset of fever, pregnancy, menstrual cycle or during any acute illness or medical condition. Benefits of Abhyanga are manifold. It strengthens the joints, nourishes the dhatus (body tissues), and balances the aggravated doshas. It helps in opening the minor strotas (micro circulation), remove the ama (toxins) and help in mobilizing it to the gut from where it is excreted. This way it helps in detoxification. It stimulates the internal organs and thus speeds up the metabolism. It brings deep relaxation

up the metabolism. It brings deep relaxation to the body and mind by reducing stress, aids in reducing blood pressure, improves skin health, reduces muscle stiffness and promotes lymphatic drainage. Abhyanga increases blood circulation, heals dry itchy skin and other skin conditions. As it calms the nerves it leads to good quality deep sleep. It Nourishes the entire body hence decreases the effects of aging. I taught science in India, and then general education in the U.S. Working as a teacher helped me realize that I wanted to continue to instruct and inspire but in a more creative and even spiritual capacity. After six years I started my own business, Akron Henna Art, with inspiration from the city where I completed my education and launched my new career."

"In order to make a positive difference in the world, my goal was to help share joy and heal people through my unique, hands-on art forms. My childhood was easy and very active. 2)Mrs. Pushpalatha: "When did you start doing henna? Tell me all about your interest in henna."

"I am a professional henna artist living in Akron,Ohio. My first brief experience with henna started when I was 8 years old. My parents sent me to a salon to learn about henna. They really wanted their child to be well rounded as they both were too. After that, I loved putting henna on my friends and cousins during different functions. I personally see it as a nice way to connect with anyone. I love the temporary, organic nature of the art form, and the connections it can often create. Henna is not simply an artform to me, it's also the connection, happiness and joy it brings to me and others. I'd also like to mention that I make my own, all-natural, henna paste mixed with essential oils to further enhance henna's ability to stain the skin. What I call chemical henna, is not all-natural, is typically black in color and uses a harmful chemical to help stain the skin. I always urge people to avoid this alternative 'black henna' found in many places."

3) Mrs. Pushpalatha: "How did you come up with the idea of applying Henna on cancer patients?"

"After deeply studying the benefits of henna, I realized it may have more

to offer. There is some information that henna might decrease the growth of tumors, prevent or reduce spasms, decrease inflammation, and relieve pain. Henna contains substances that also might help fight certain infections. On top of that, I found henna proven to be an astringent, which may help to reduce signs of aging, wrinkles, and fine lines. It is also used to reduce blemishes, dark spots, and scars on the skin. Its antiviral, antibacterial, and cooling properties also make it useful for treating wounds, sunburns, and skin rashes. It is a totally natural, plant-based dye."

"I started the Henna Crown project as a tribute to my parents. I saw firsthand what they went through as they both suffered and passed from cancer. There is difficulty for anyone going through this challenge, when faith and courage can be tested to the extreme. The Henna Crown in my mind helps to bring back these things, a new representation of courage, beauty and strength that the person can draw on. Every person going through the cancer battle has a beautiful warrior spirit inside and I hope they can see that with my help so they can carry on in their best way."

4) Mrs. Pushpalath: "Apart from Henna , I see you are very creative. What are your other habits and interests?"

"I love teaching and making my art in different ways. I also lead art classes on behalf of Access the Arts, a non-profit, with the Medina Juvenile Center to share a new artistic expression with kids so they can learn how to create works of art under my guidance. Some recent creations that I am proud of include a one-of-a-kind, hand painted and decorated door which was displayed alongside several others at the First Congregational Church in Akron, to recognize and support LGBTQ+ and diversity in the community. The piece was inspired by my mandala-style art which is a favorite and is expressed in many mediums from customized art works to brides-to-be in traditional Indian weddings. Then in 2021, my mandala art was showcased among 15 other artists for the city of Stow as a beautification project. My wood-work was digitized and then turned into a vinyl wrap to be displayed on light boxes at intersections. My goal was to use bright and cheery colors to help bring positivity and joy to those who see it along their travels. The work was highlighted by a visit from city of Stow Mayor John Pribonic and follow up articles in the Stow Sentry, Akron Beacon Journal and the Good Morning Cleveland news program. This city beautification project was appreciated so much that the city of Stow selected me as a finalist to display a public work again in 2022 and again in 2023. All of these different art forms interest me but on the same level of love is my interest in dancing. I've been classically taught in Bharatanatyam which I still enjoy but just having fun with modern dance and music makes my heart soar!"
